Everyone has a sexual orientation and gender identity!

Biological sex is a combination of chromosomes, production of and response to hormones, and reproductive anatomy. Traditionally thought of as either male or female, sex also includes numerous biological sex conditions that do not strictly align with either male or female. This is most commonly known as intersex. https://isna.org

Sex assigned at birth is the sex assigned by a healthcare provider, at birth, based on external reproductive anatomy. Sex assigned at birth does not account for hormone production, hormone response or chromosomes.

Administrative sex is the sex designated on legal documents such as a passport or state issued ID. Administrative sex may match a person's sex assigned at birth or their gender identity, depending on personal choice or state laws.

Gender is a culture-dependent term that links societal norms, behaviors, and expectations with specific sexes. Gender varies across cultures. There is not a single universal set of rules for gender distinctions.

Gender identity is a person's internal sense of being female, male, a combination of both, or neither.

Sexual orientation is a person's innate romantic and/or sexual attraction to others.



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
