GENERAL INPATIENT LEVEL OF CARE

Admission criteria:

- 1. Uncontrolled pain, including sudden onset or new manifestation of pain, requiring increased titration of medications and increased staff intervention.
- 2. Uncontrolled nausea and vomiting or other major GI symptoms requiring frequent intervention with medication and nursing assessment of client response.
- 3. Pain and symptoms remain uncontrolled with prescribed medication and close observation and frequent nursing assessments needed to determine the client's response.
- 4. New seizure activity that requires intervention of a physician, initiation of prescribed medication and close, frequent nursing observation of client's response to medication.
- 5. Terminal restlessness requiring frequent intervention with medication and nursing assessment of client response.
- 6. Exacerbating shortness of breath or dyspnea requiring frequent assessment, increased use of medication or oxygen, and increased staff intervention.
- 7. IV or subcutaneous medications are initiated and close observation and frequent nursing assessments are needed to determine the client's response.
- 8. Acute anxiety or depression requiring frequent intervention with prescribed medication and/or increased need of social worker to provide support and recommendations.
- 9. Adjustments in medications that include dose changes or additions of new medications requiring increased nursing assessment of client's response.
- 10. New admission where new orders are initiated and there is more intense intervention needed from the hospice interdisciplinary team.
- 11. Increased need for evaluation by a physician secondary to changing medical condition.
- 12. An acute general deterioration requiring increased nursing intervention.

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
